

Types and signs of poisoning:

- **Ingested** (when a pet eats something they shouldn't)
- **Inhaled** (when a pet inhales chemical fumes or smoke)
- Absorbed (when a pet absorbs toxins through the skin)

SIGNS: Excessive salivation, racing or irregular pulse, vomiting, lethargy, rapid breathing or cold extremities

Vulnerability depends on species, amount ingested and pet size.





What to do if you suspect poisoning:

- Rinse mouth or skin immediately with water
- Call a veterinary professional to assess the risk to your pet

Information to have on hand when calling:

- What was ingested or touched, how much and where
- Estimated time of exposure
- Pet's current weight and medical history
- A sample of the product, ingested object(s) or vomit

How to avoid an accidental poisoning:

- After using cleaning solutions, pesticide sprays or bleach, block access to rooms until surfaces are dry and the room is well-ventilated
- Keep medications, pest control products and cleaning & household supplies sealed and out of reach
- Ask guests to keep their personal belongings behind closed doors
- Close the lids on toilets and trash cans when not in use

- Mouse/rat poison

- Topical flea/tick medication intended for dogs
